Keynote Speaker Dr. Hope Rivers Location: Russell House Ballroom

Dr. Hope Rivers

Dr. Hope E. Rivers, President of Piedmont Technical

College (PTC), has been a driving force in the community. Her tenure at the college has been marked by significant progress in advancing its mission to provide accessible, high-quality education and training opportunities. Under her leadership, PTC serves the largest area in South Carolina's technical college system. Additionally, she has shown over two decades of commitment to education in South Carolina.

Dr. Rivers' visionary leadership has propelled PTC to new heights. Under her guidance, the college has seen an impressive 11% increase in enrollment and secured funding commitments for ten renovation and capital improvement projects. These include a new health science facility in Greenwood and advanced manufacturing centers in Saluda and Edgefield counties. Her innovative initiatives, such as establishing The Hope Pantry food bank on campus, reviving the Honors Program, expanding work-based learning opportunities, redesigning math and English curricula, and implementing new technology systems to enhance student services and communications, have not only drawn interest from other technical colleges but also set a new standard for excellence in the field.

Dr. Rivers' influence extends far beyond the walls of PTC. She serves on several high-profile governing boards and committees at the local, state, and national levels, including the South Carolina Governor's School for Agriculture at John de la Howe, Greenwood Chamber of Commerce, Greenwood Together, Laurens County Development Corporation, South Carolina Department of Commerce Upper Savannah Regional Education Center Advisory, Ten at the Top, Upstate Alliance, SC State Chamber of Commerce, SC Arts Foundation Board, and the USC National Center for First-Year Experience Advisory.

Her outstanding leadership and contributions have been recognized with several awards, including the University of South Carolina Distinguished Black Alumni Award, the 2019 SC Woman on the Move Award

from the American Association of Community Colleges, and a feature on the NEWS19 WLTX, Columbia series, "A Seat at the Table." Rivers was also honored with a commemorative brick in the historic University of South Carolina Horseshoe, a testament to her trailblazing contributions in the field of education. Her exemplary work even earned her an invitation to the White House to speak with First Lady Jill Biden about the role of technical colleges in supporting economic development and workforce needs.

As a first-generation college student herself from a small rural town, Dr. Rivers serves as an inspiring and relatable role model. With an inclusive, innovative, and authoritative approach, she tirelessly works to enhance student experiences and success at PTC, driving accessible, impactful technical education that supports economic mobility and workforce development in South Carolina.

Ombuds: Interesting Name and Serious Help! Room 229 (Theater)





Session: This session will discuss the unique role of the Ombuds as a resource to assist staff and faculty who are dealing with conflict in the workplace. The presenters will explain how the office is structured as an independent, neutral, confidential, and informal resource for conflict management within the organizational setting. Learn how the Ombuds listens to individuals' concerns, helps clarify issues, assists in developing

options towards resolution and is an advocate for fair and equitable processes within the organization. The presenters will discuss how the Ombuds contributes to enhancing inclusive communication, staff and faculty productivity, and healthy workplace environments.

Presenters: Robynn Pease serves as the inaugural USC Staff Ombuds. Before coming to USC in January 2024, Robynn served as the Associate Ombuds at Oregon State University (OSU) where she consulted with staff, faculty, graduate and undergraduate students. At OSU, she also served as the Assistant Director of the Family Resource Center, director of the Academic Affairs Office of Work-Life and the Greater Oregon Higher Education Recruitment Consortium, assisting staff, faculty, and students

with dependent care needs across the lifespan. Robynn holds a doctorate in Sociology with expertise in gerontology and social inequalities. She is a trained mediator, member of the International Ombuds Association and a certified long-care ombudsman in Oregon and Kentucky.

Robin DiPietro is the USC Faculty Ombuds, the Director of the International Institute for Foodservice Research and Education, and a Professor at the University of South Carolina in the Hospitality and Tourism Management program. She received her BS, MBA, and PhD from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. Dr. DiPietro has research interests in multi-unit chain restaurant operations and human resources issues inherent to restaurant operations including motivation, leadership, employee retention, and staffing issues of organizations. She has over 150 publications on a range of topics in the foodservice and hospitality industries. She became the faculty ombuds in August 2024 and has helped faculty in a wide range of areas. She is available by phone, online meetings, or face-to-face meetings to help faculty navigate University resources and opportunities.

The Introverted Leader: Navigating Power, Positionality, and Peace, Room 302



Session: Studies have purported that 50% of the general population identify as introverts. That number decreases to 12% among Americans in supervisory positions, and a striking 4% at the executive level. The disproportionate number of senior leaders identifying as introverts is a phenomenon that has been studied at length. However, less attention has been given to understanding and cultivating the success of the 4%. In this session, participants will engage with literature, best practices, and the collective wisdom in the room to better understand what it means to be an introverted leader. Participants will gain new insight and practical strategies to successfully navigate the nuances of power, positionality, and peace for an introvert in leadership.

Presenter: Dr. Culbreath currently serves as the Vice Dean for Strategy & Engagement at the University of South Carolina, in the College of Arts and Sciences. In her role, she leads collegiate efforts to support faculty and staff development, address workplace climate, and actively engage community stakeholders. As a trained therapist and an experienced engagement strategist, her commitment to those in the workplace grows stronger each year. Her experience with assessment, change management, and strategic planning offers an acute ability to help individuals, teams, and leaders acknowledge their values and move in the direction of their intentions.

Mylene earned her doctorate from the University of Georgia's internationally acclaimed Workforce Education program, with an emphasis in Training & Development. Her praxis strives to reconcile workplace satisfaction at the intersection of positionality and organizational climate. She often leverages her training as a Certified CliftonStrengths coach to meet people where they are and chart a path to where they want to be. Dr. Culbreath has presented her work nationally and internationally, authored journal articles and book chapters, and developed countless career and workplace related programs for corporate, non-profit, higher education, and government agencies. She is an advocate, she is a change maker, she is a supporter of those seeking to make the world of work better.

Fostering Community through Mutual Aid, Room 305



Session: The CommUnity Shop is a student-run organization which provides food, professional clothes, school supplies, and hygiene products for free to anyone with a Carolina Card. Since August of last year, we have served 2,116 people and given away over 41,000 items. We could not have done any of it alone and through donation drives and partnerships, we have collected over 47,000 items. Through this project, students learn how to foster community both on and off campus and the value of mutual aid. Students are encouraged to explore horizontal, and collaborative decision making, cultural sensitivity, stigma reduction, class consciousness, and pervasive issues in nonprofit.

Presenter: Rachel Brasell is the Basic Needs Coordinator at the University of South Carolina and oversees the Gamecock

CommUnity Shop. She is committed to mitigating food insecurity and contributing to the creation of a comprehensive system addressing the barriers students face as the costs of attending college and living rise. Building a community of on and off campus support while nurturing the connections among student volunteers and clients is important to understanding how interdependent we all are and instilling a sense of shared responsibility. Rachel is a Licensed Master Social Worker who has spent the last seventeen years as a public servant in the nonprofit sector and is originally from Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Why Women Aren't Winning at Health (but can), Room 315

Session: Is achieving optimal health within your grasp? Let's discuss the science and history about why women are more likely to be negatively impacted by the healthcare delivery system. We will wrap up with tangible ways you can get the healthcare you deserve.

Presenter: Marjorie R. Jenkins, MD MEdHP FACP. Dr. Jenkins joined the USC School of Medicine Greenville as Dean

from Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center in Lubbock, Texas, where she was a Professor of Medicine and the founder of the Laura Bush Institute for Women's Health, a biomedical research and health education institute spanning across five health professionals' schools and six campuses. She also served as the Director of Medical and Scientific Initiatives for the FDA Office of Women's Health, where she provided sex and gender scientific expertise within scientific programs. In addition to her medical degree from East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, Tennessee, Dr. Jenkins holds a degree in Chemical Engineering and a Master of Education in the Health Professions (MEdHP).

Dr. Jenkins is a well-recognized expert in women's health and sex and gender based medicine and has served in a variety of national roles such as Program Chair of the 2015 and 2018 National Sex and Gender Health Professional Education Summits and co-Chair of the Reproduction Workgroup of NASA's Decadal Review, and as a member of the USM LE Women's Health National Board of Medical Examiners Writing Group, HRSA expert panel advisories, and NIH expert panels. She recently co-authored the book Why Women Aren't Winning at Health (but can).

37 Words That Changed It All: Title IX & How You Can Contribute, Room 322



Session: Who knew 37 words would have such an impact over the past 50 years? Title IX laid the foundation for more equity in education in 1972. Since then, we have fought sexual harassment, advocated for gender equity in admissions and employment, championed women's athletics, supported pregnant students, and much more. While progress has occurred, there is much to be done. This session will celebrate what has been accomplished, take a critical look at the current state of Title IX, and anticipate what we may see in the next ten years before the 60th anniversary. Participants will determine how they can best use their skills and position to be change agents to further ensure all people, regardless of sex and gender, have access to education.

Presenter: Molly Peirano (she/her) strives to live a life of purpose focused on civil rights, access, and education. As the Associate Vice President for Civil Rights & Title IX at USC, she also

serves as the Title IX Coordinator, Americans with Disabilities Act/504 Coordinator, and Equal Employment Opportunity Coordinator. She began her service in this area as a volunteer and went on to be named the 2018 Community Partner of the Year by the Sexual Assault Response Network of Central Ohio. Molly serves on volunteer boards for Delta Gamma Fraternity and the YWCA, which supports the mission of eliminating racism and empowering women. She loves traveling with her 4-pound yorkie, Monty.

BITBR is in its third year, with over one hundred episodes in its library and quickly becoming the go-to for political commentary in the Palmetto State. Notable podcast guests include Governors Riley, Beasley, Hodges, and Sanford, Congressman Jim Clyburn, former Presidential Chief of Staff Mick Mulvaney, Chuck Todd of Meet the Press, Speaker of the House Murrell Smith, Senate Minority Leader

Brad Hutto, and many other elected officials and intriguing political figures.

Joel Lourie comes from a background of public service, where he served 18 years in the South Carolina House of Representatives and State Senate. He has been recognized by numerous organizations for his work on healthcare, education, and improving the lives of all South Carolinians, particularly seniors and children. In addition, Joel has a 35-year history as a business owner and founded Lourie Life & Health in 2011. Since that time, Lourie Life & Health has grown to be a regional leader in the Health Insurance and Medicare industry.

Joel is a native of Columbia, a graduate of the public school system and the University of South Carolina. The Louries have been in South Carolina since the early 1900s, where the family-owned and operated a department store for 96 years. Also, Joel's father served in the SC Legislature for 28 years.

Sandy Senn



Sandy Senn is a wife and mother of three living in Charleston, South Carolina. She is a 1990 graduate of the University of South Carolina School of Law.

After graduation, Senn was a law clerk to United States District Judge Henry M. Herlong and to the South Carolina Circuit Judge David F. McInnis. Senn has practiced primarily in the area of civil rights defenses for first responders serving many governmental agencies throughout the state. She is also General Counsel for the South Carolina Sheriff's Association.

Senn's first political run was in November of 2016, where she was elected to

serve as the Republican Senator for Senate District 41, which includes Charleston and Dorchester Counties. She currently serves on the South Carolina Senate Judiciary, Transportation, Corrections and Penology, Medical Affairs, and Labor, Commerce, and Industry Committees. Chair of the Charleston County Senate Legislative Delegation 2021- present, Conservation Voters of SC Green Tie Award 2021, Charleston Chamber's Champions of Business Award 2022, SC Sheriff's Association Legislative Champion 2023, Women in Leadership Leading Legacy Award 2023, and the John F. Kennedy Profile in Courage Award 2023.

Session: Advocacy, support, and education for individuals and families impacted by mental health.

Presenter: Bill Lindsey brings a passion for reforming mental health care in South Carolina. He has forged relationships with the media, the legislature, advocacy groups, state agencies, health organizations, and most importantly, the families, care givers, and receivers of services of those with mental illness. member of the SC Institute of Health Behavioral Health Committee, Suicide Prevention Coalition, senate appointee of the IMD Study Committee, SCORxE committee member, State Provider Education Trainer, Family-to-Family Teacher, NAMI Family Support Group Facilitator. However, it does not list the legislative campaigns, bills, and laws too numerous to mention, that he has championed. Bill is the Executive Director National Alliance on Mental Illness South Carolina (NAMI SC).

Beyond Expectations: Women in Caregiving Roles, Room 315



Session: Women disproportionally find themselves in the role of being a family caregiver for a large range of both family and friends. This session will help learners identify what aspects make someone a family caregiver; examine gender disparities in caregiving; provide insight into preparing for the caregiver role; discuss ways employers can support caregiving employees; and finally, share national and statewide resources to support family caregivers. The purpose of this session is to empower participants to navigate the challenges of caregiving while raising awareness among employers about the importance of supporting family caregivers in the workplace.

Presenter: Jennifer Brewton is the Divisional Manager of the Caregiver and Alzheimer's Resource Division at the South Carolina Department on Aging. With over twelve years of experience in the aging field, Jennifer serves as the

Family Caregiver Support Program Manager for the state. Alongside her team, she oversees the administration of critical initiatives including the Alzheimer's Resource Coordination Center, our state's first Dementia Care Specialist role, and the state's Lifespan Respite Grant.

Jennifer's career journey encompasses various roles within the aging field. For over 12 years she dedicated her expertise to Prisma Health's PACE (Program of All-inclusive Care for the Elderly) program. Her professional repertoire extends to long-term care, in-patient hospital care, and leadership as the Area Agency on Aging Director for the Central Midlands region which serves the state's capital city and surrounding counties.

Recognized for her proficiency in the field, Jennifer has been invited to speak at prestigious nationallevel conferences, including the Home and Community Based Service Conference and the American Society on Aging Conference.

Jennifer holds a Master's in Social Work from the University of South Carolina, where she cultivated her passion for serving the aging population. Outside of her professional endeavors, she cherishes time with her family, including her two children, two dogs, two cats, and supportive husband. Free Speech and Academic Freedom, Room 322
