



International Accelerator Program Courses

ENFS 091 (EAP A)

English for Academic Purposes (EAP A) is part of the first stage in the International Accelerator Program (IAP) and its purpose is to prepare students to enter the University of South Carolina as undergraduates ready to meet the English language demands students will encounter in university courses. This integrated skills course has a mandatory co-requisite of ENFS 092, which must be taken in the same semester, and it focuses on technology literacy, information literacy, vocabulary acquisition, grammar and editing, orthographic control, phonological control, overall spoken production as well as writing, reading, and listening. The course has been designed to improve students' English language skills in an academic context. ENFS 092 (EAP B)

English for Academic Purposes (EAP B) is part of the first stage in the International Accelerator Program (IAP) and its purpose is to prepare students to enter the University of South Carolina as undergraduates ready to meet the English language demands students will encounter in university courses. This integrated skills course has a mandatory co-requisite of ENFS 091, which must be taken in the same semester, and it focuses on technology literacy, information literacy, vocabulary acquisition, grammar and editing, orthographic control, phonological control, overall spoken production as well as writing, reading, and listening. The course has been designed to improve students' English language skills in an academic context. ENFS 093

Integrated Linguistic Skills for Non-native Speakers/Course Supplement is a non-credit bearing course designed to assist students in their university core courses. In this course, students discuss vocabulary strategies, study skills, and writing skills necessary for their general university courses.

LING 102 (EAP2a)

Integrated Linguistic Skills for Non-native Speakers 1 (EAP2a) is part of the second stage in the International Accelerator Program. This course has a mandatory co-requisite of LING 103, which must be taken in the same semester. This eight-week course focuses on developing academic English skills in the areas of writing, grammar, reading, listening and speaking. The assignments in this course are designed to develop the necessary skills to be successful in university core content classes, and they include challenging readings and lectures, note-taking skills, writing academic essays that integrate information from class readings and lectures, giving formal and informal oral presentations, developing research skills to succeed in academic classes, and building content vocabulary for university courses.

Integrated Linguistic Skills for Non-native Speakers (EAP2b) is the fourth course in the International Accelerator Program. This course has a mandatory co-requisite of LING 102, which must be taken in the same semester. This eight-week course focuses on developing academic English skills in the areas of writing, grammar, reading, listening and speaking. The assignments in this course are designed to develop the necessary skills to be successful in university core content classes, and they include challenging readings and lectures, note-taking skills, writing academic essays that integrate information from class readings and lectures, giving formal and informal oral presentations, developing research skills to succeed in academic classes, and building content vocabulary for university courses.

Integrated Linguistic Skills for Non-native Speakers 3 (LING 104) is part of the third stage in the International Accelerator Program. This course is designed to prepare students to meet the English language demands of the classes and studies students encounter as undergraduates at the University of South Carolina. Students work on challenging readings and lectures, develop research and reading skills to succeed in university classes, write academic essays that integrate researched information, give oral presentations and participate in class discussions, practice lecture note-taking skills, and build vocabulary used in general academic discourse as well as in specific disciplines.

UNIV 290-Foundations; UNIV 290-Bridge; UNIV 290-Learning Track

These courses are designed to help International Accelerator Program students adjust to the university, to develop a better understanding of the learning process, and to acquire and/or develop essential survival skills connected with success in college and in life thereafter. The courses provide a general orientation to the functions and resources of the university and also provide a support group to students in a critical year by examining problems common to the first year experience. Extensive reading and writing assignments relevant to the students' first year college experience are required. Attaining a balance between individual freedom and social responsibility underlies the course activities of UNIV 290.



Cumulative GPA of Enrolled Students


