- **Work Values & Interests:** Think about what motivates you — helping others, solving problems, leading teams, or creating things? Your values and preferences can point you toward fitting career paths.

- **What Can I Do with This Major?** – Explore how different majors connect to career fields and compare opportunities.
- **Academic Bulletin** – See the required courses for each major to get a sense of what you'd actually study.
