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# USC Lancaster Faculty Meeting Minutes October 6, 2023

#### CALL TO ORDER: 12:30 PM D. Lawrence

**<u>CORRECTION/APPROVAL OF MINUTES</u>**: The minutes of the September Faculty Organization meeting were approved.

#### REPORTS OF OFFICERS:

Dean of the Campus – Dr. Walter Collins, report submitted (Appendix 1).

• Page 1: Enrollment is at an historic high and up in both traditional on-campus and dual credit students. Faculty search is continuing for Instructor of Business and searches are beginning for Assistant Professor of History/African American Studies and Assistant Professor of Library/Director of Archives. Please support our sports as soccer and volleyball seasons are underway. The annual Richard Gannaway Scholarship Luncheon has been scheduled for Wednesday, November 1 at noon. Please RSVP by October 16. We received notification of the award of federal earmark funding of \$110,000 from the Department of Health Resources and Services Administration for a piece of equipment for the nursing lab. Like our sibling Palmetto College campuses, we will soon be contracting with third party vendor Ed2go to supplement faculty and staff-offered nonacademic credit professional and continuing education options for individuals, businesses, and industry partners. This will allow USCL to expand its reach into the community and drive more views to our website.

Question: will USCL be able to be selective about what will appear on the Ed2go list of offerings?

Answer: Yes.

University of Alabama Press for best southern history book. He will also be joining the editorial board for the International Journal of Disney Studies.

• Please see report for items of interest to our campus, one of which is the system's plan to phase out other learning management systems to work with one system (Blackboard) through the remainder of the contract. There will be a committee to examine how to move forward with LMSs in the future.

Palmetto College Rights and Responsibilities Committee – R. Freeman, presenter.

• The committee is looking at grievance protocols beyond our campus as well as approving a PCAM class in success in college for nursing students.

Palmetto College Welfare Committee - S. Aghasafari, presenter.

• Please attend the Tenure and Promotion workshop following this meeting.

Palmetto College DEI Council – D. Lawrence, presenter.

- PC DEI counsel met and is discussing a name change as a preemptive move requested by administration in Columbia, which has already changed its Office of DEI to the Office of Access and Opportunity. The VP of DEI title has also changed to VP of Access, Civil Rights and Community Engagement.
- PC needs to have its own name rather than that same name as that of the Columbia campus. It is considering Access, Opportunity and Engagement

Committee because it echoes PC's Mission Statement language. The committee is soliciting feedback. Email Dana Lawrence with comments and suggestions.

- Question: what is the purpose of the name change?
- Answer: a preemptive response to anticipated legislative moves. There has been funding threats made where the legislature wants to know about anything related to DEI. The idea is to tie titles of offices and positions to federal laws to limit the power of the SC legislature to police the funding. There has been discussion about the name changes being meaningless and also not communicating our DEI goals.

# LOCAL COMMITTEES:

*Athletics Advisory Committee Report* – B. Obi Johnson, report submitted (Appendix 6).

- Committee Members this year are Nick Calhoun (Athletics), Evan Nooe (Humanities), John Rutledge (BBCEL), Mat Williamson (TriO), Noah Robinson (student rep), Walt Collins (Campus Dean), Bettie Obi Johnson (MSNPH) --Chair.
- Discussed issue of students missing class due to games, that it is hard for them to get missed work completed, and that the committee wants to encourage faculty to allow students to make up their work, acknowledging that it is the students' responsibility to work with faculty in advance on those arrangements. Committee is looking into ways of improving communication between athletics and faculty, possibly by assigning a staff member to assist with this.
- Committee wants to help promote athletics events and increase participation on campus for home games.
- Committee discussed service projects for student athletes to get more involved on campus and in the community, possibly in conjunction with Trio.
- Question: it is very difficult to provide make up labs due to set up time, materials, etc. Coaches need to get schedules (including dismissal times for travel) to faculty and students need to discuss absences with faculty well in advance.
- Question: will there be a continuation of the mid-semester check-up sheets that the committee began last year? (they were progress reports that students had to request from their professors)
- Question: how much are coaches aware of their athletes' situations?
- Concern was expressed over whether or not student athletes should look for or be guided to take online sections during their season, acknowledging that many students need FTF instruction.

- Concern with respect to labs: maybe sciences can meet to figure out the makeup lab issue. Student athletes should meet with professor at beginning of the semester to see calendar and conflicts.
- Concern with less communication from coaches.
- A suggestion to look at our own class scheduling to accommodate sports.
- Advisors hearing some reports of language barrier interfering with student success, with the new focus on international student athletes.
- Concern over the idea of student athletes adding a service component to their already busy schedules. Can they take 12 hours during their season and make up 3 in the summer?
- A suggestion to make FTF courses have a strong online component that students who have to miss FTF instruction can easily keep up (video lectures, notes, tests, etc.)
- UNIV 101 teaches time management. Athletes as overwhelmed with their schedules. UNIV 101 spends lots of time showing students how to submit work on BB. Can orientation do this how can we manage that?
- Discussion of the importance of UNIV 101 for all students and student athletes.
- Discussion of difficulties of doing online component at same time as FTF and be effective. Can the deans, coaches, committee come up with a way for FTF faculty to learn to layer on online components without duplicating our workload?
- How can advisors learn what certain classes entail to help them advise the athletes? Discussion about how athletes are advised, often late in the summer after many courses are full.

## Hiring Priorities Committee Report – T. Scarlett, report submitted (Appendix 7).

- Recommending two positions: replacement for archivist at NASC, replacement for Adam Biggs (history/AA Studies). There was discussion about broadening the secondary area of expertise to cultural studies or similar, but the committee felt that the priority is AA Studies/History.
- Question: how soon is too soon to start telling potential applicants?
- Answer: postings are not ready to share yet need final approval from Columbia campus.

## *NASC Advisory Committee Report* – E. Nooe, report submitted (Appendix 8).

 Please see report for activities and encourage faculty/students/community to attend. Artist in residence Chief Harris will be presenting pottery making across the fall semester. Stephen Criswell is presenting at the Lunch and Learn in October on the folklore of Halloween. There are two new exhibits: artist Nancy Basket's use of vine in basket making and Indigenous sports and athleticism. Evan Nooe and the NASC Committee is organizing a booth at the Southern Historical Association conference 11/9-12 in Charlotte. 18<sup>th</sup> Annual NAS Week will have a range of presentations, film screening, and discussions, including Pulitzer Prize-winning author David Maraniss on Jim Thorpe. # **Recent and Upcoming Events Overview**

On October 9<sup>th</sup>, the ASC will host a roundtable discussion with representatives from across the academic divisions to explore the opportunities and challenges of artificial intelligence at the university and beyond. The discussion will touch on issues such as the use of ChatGPT by students and the role of AI in scholarship. All members of the university are encouraged to attend, so feel free to send students. We will maintain a check-in sheet. Reception and refreshments begins at noon, but the talk itself commences at 12:20 to allow for attendees coming from 11-12:15 classes.

Our recent Health Sciences Studio event recorded 23 attendees, which is a huge success and introduced the center to many new students. In addition, we are seeing significant increases in interest in Math Lab and Writers' Studio. Some of this increase has to do with our adjustment of hours and schedules, e.g., Writers' Studio is now 4 hours long, while Health Sciences Studio events are coordinated with the Nursing program's needs. If you have students who prefer a drop-in, as-needed service over scheduled appointments, please recommend these services to them.

The ASC is also seeing very high levels of demand relative to the number of appointments available. Please encourage your students to make appointments as much in advance as they can, though we do try to accommodate walk-in appointments if tutors are available, and students can always monitor our booking site for last minute cancellations.

# Summary of Tutoring Data


**Year-to-year trends:** We saw a healthy increase of 7.8% in the total number of tutoring sessions over 2022. One notable driver of the increase is the well-attended Health Sciences Studio event. This also added to the number of individual students we served, because several attendees were new to the ASC. The ASC is seeing very robust numbers relative to the number of appointments available.

**Session distribution trends:** We saw a significant increase in the preference for studio services in September. We also saw a *decrease* in the preference for online sessions. At this moment, we are seeing significant demand for nursing courses from students in a cohort that is primarily on-campus, but we will monitor this trend while we continue to make online options available.



# **INFORMATION ITEMS:**

# 1) Open Enrollment

Open Enrollment for benefits is October 1 - 31, 2023.

Any changes you make during Open Enrollment take effect January 1, 2024.

Changes to Dental Plans may be made during this Open Enrollment.

If you are satisfied with your current coverage, you do not need to do anything during open enrollment.

However, you must re-enroll in Medical Spending, Dependent Care, and HSA accounts each year.

Significant changes to your State Health Plan benefits will take effect on January 1, 2024.

- Health insurance premiums will not increase for active employees nor funded retirees.
- Permanent, part-time teacher, partially funded retiree, non-funded retiree, COBRA subscriber, survivor and former spouse health insurance premiums will increase.
- Premiums for Dental Plus and the State Vision Plan will increase.
- The State Health plan will cover an annual well woman visit at no member cost for eligible female non-Medicare primary members.
- The State Health Plan will cover birth control at no member cost for primary members covered as child dependents.
- Total Administrative Services Corporation (TASC) will be the new State Flexible Benefits Plan (MoneyPlus) administrator. Administrative fees will reduce to \$2.14 per account per month.

#### **USC Columbia Faculty Senate**

Relevant portions of 9/13/23 meeting

1. Report from the President

University's decision to automatically accept top 10% of high school class (SC students provided they meet course requirements). Will attract lower income students. In-state tuition and fees have not increased. Out of state tuition increased after 4 years of no increases.

If we receive designation as an Innovation Hub (outcome of Chips and Science Act), it will create opportunity, higher paying jobs, and significant grants. Application as a coalition with other SC campuses and we will know in a few weeks if we get this designation.

For workforce development we are creating certificate programs. Digital Skills Certificate was first. Upcoming for consideration of the senate are project and team management, communications, and data analytics.

Wants an initiative to hire (not just replace) more tenure track faculty – currently working on the numbers.

Political activity: referred to recent articles about flagships spending too much and only admitting elite students. Referred to West Virginia University when enrollments go down (you build and they don't come). Stressed we are not elitist, not increasing the cost at least for a number of years now, careful about projects, ensuring any spending we have necessary finances, which makes us slower, but its better to be slow and careful. Be confident we are carefully managing.

2. Report from the Provost

Review last year: hired 7 deans, restructured office of Provost with hires; set minimum salary of tenure track and professional track faculties; facility upgrades; classroom analysis/occupancy rates; Title IX issues that impacted faculty moral over time; Imagine Carolina for faculty – ongoing work; transition to 4 year advisory model which built off of award winning freshman advising program; retention program – talking to students about challenges, barriers (greatest risk time is between sophomore and junior year); faculty development – programming based on listening tours – stagnation at associate level – first program will be to help mid-career faculty advance to professor.

Goals for this year: Gen Z expectations – easy access to info (fast and integrated into a single platform – smartphone); 1 in 2 have been diagnosed with a mental health condition; with 4 year advising model there will be more money to hire advisors in the colleges; continue graduation retention network; focus on 1<sup>st</sup> Gen students (20% of all students 1<sup>st</sup> Gen); pairing 1<sup>st</sup> Gen students with

mentors if program is funded; reduce curricular complexity; improve success rates in bottleneck courses – peer to peer support model in Calculus started; looking at improve teaching evaluations; looking at improving online course offerings, looking to transition to one LMS (Blackboard) but also will evaluate BB and other LMS's for future; exploring partnership with Google to offer certificates and would be offered out of Continuing Education; developing a first year faculty onboarding program; launched first bridge from fellow to faculty program; focusing on cascading communication model.

- 3. Guest Speaker
  - Christian Anderson, 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Reconstruction Project

Discussed enrollment of first Black student and hiring of first Black faculty member during Reconstruction. USC was only public university in the south to integrate after the Civil War. Accomplishments of reconstruction era faculty/students is significant. History of Reconstruction at USC is not well known at the university, so the 150<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Reconstruction Project will mark the anniversary of the first Black student on October 7. There is an upcoming lecture about the two Black trustees appointed in 1869. A marker was recently unveiled on Sumter St to commemorate Reconstruction era-progress at USC. Asks faculty to visit it and consider this topic and how and why it ended.

Advance notice of amendment of previous motion in 2021 to adopt test optional admissions through 2023. Committee wants to recommend to continue this policy for the foreseeable future with the committee's periodic review. Formal motion in October meeting.

• Committee on Curricula and Courses

Committee on Curricula and Course Report (proposed changes) link here

GEO 345 being withdrawn from approval request

Motion to divide the question, pulling out Public Relations and Mass Communication program changes. The concern is that some of their specific core requirements make it difficult for students to change to other programs.

Motion passed, all other curricular and program changes passed, motion to return Public Relations and Mass Communication changes to committee to seek clarification.

# Hiring Priorities Committee 2023-24 Fall Report

The Hiring Priorities Committee normally makes recommendations in the spring for searches to be conducted the following academic year. However, there are two replacement positions that need to be filled as soon as possible. The Hiring Priorities Committee has evaluated those needs and the justifications and recommendations are listed below.

#### **Recommended Hires**

#### Archivist

- There is a vacancy in the archivist position at the NASC.
- The committee recommends that this position be filled as soon as possible.

#### History/AFAM

- Dr. Adam Biggs has accepted a position at another university. Dr. Biggs taught US history and African American studies.
- There is a strong demand for US history courses. Much of the demand comes from dual enrollment.
- The committee has discussed the need for someone who could teach cultural/ethnic/diversity studies in addition to AFAM. However, these specialties would more logically pair with disciplines such as anthropology, sociology, psychology, English, law, or religion. Also, the demand for history courses would preclude a historian from offering a range of other courses.
- The committee recommends hiring a historian to replace Dr. Biggs. We further recommend advertisement for someone who could also teach AFAM or other cultural or diversity studies.



#### <u>Upward Bound</u>

- Our Upward Bound project is in year two of a five-year grant cycle which will conclude on May 31, 2027. We are currently serving 34 students from first-generation and low-income backgrounds at **Andrew Jackson**, **Buford**, and **Lancaster High Schools**. We must increase our official enrollment to a minimum of 62 by the end of the current reporting period on May 31, 2024. We are in the process of reviewing 64 pending applications. This puts us in good shape to reach our target enrollment.
- An orientation session for the parents of both new and existing participants was held at USCL on September 7.
- A Welcome Back Session for all participants was held at USCL on September 12.
- Eddie Boykin conducted a Tools Inventory session on September 28. This featured an overview of the services which the project provides (e.g., advising, college visits, dual enrollment, financial aid, and tutoring) to all participants. This included a review of South Carolina Occupational Information System (SCOIS) services.
- There will be a **Financial Aid Prep** session on Thursday, October 12 in the TRiO LRC at 4:30 p.m.
- All participants are being encouraged to attend USCL's **Fall Open House** on Saturday, October 28.

#### **Child Care Access Means Parents in School**

- **CCAMPIS** is a federal grant program funded by the United States Department of Education (ED) to support student-parents. It exists to support the participation of low-income college students who have children under the age of 12 or with special needs, through the provision of campus-based childcare services.
- USCL's current CCAMPIS project ended on September 30, 2023. A new proposal was submitted to ED this past summer for roughly \$1.15 million in funding for four years (2024-27). Unfortunately, our application package did not score high enough to be recommended for a new grant award.
- ED received 152 eligible applications for new awards requesting over \$76 million. With the funds available for new grant awards, they were able to fund in rank order, the top 34 applications based on the total score assigned to the application. All applications recommended for funding scored 105 points or higher. Our proposal received a score of 98.

#### **Community Service**

#### Legislative Updates

- The federal government will remain open until Friday, November 17. Neither the House nor Senate had completed work on 12 FY24 appropriations bills needed to keep the government operating when the fiscal year started on October 1. A Continuing Resolution (CR), a short-term funding measure that level-funds all government programs, was necessary to ensure that a federal government "shutdown" didn't occur.
- The House has cancelled its upcoming recess period so that it, along with the Senate, can continue working on FY24 appropriation bills. Should the Congress fail to complete its work on all FY24 appropriations bills by November 17, either a new CR will be needed to keep the federal government operating or there will be a temporary government "shutdown."
- According to the Council for Opportunity in Education (COE), the Federal TRiO Programs are forward funded, and current funds are already secured. As of now, ED does not anticipate any delays in our Annual Performance Reports (APRs), but there may be an impact if the shutdown continues to progress.
