
Southern Jail Inventory 2021 Report


The following report shows characteristics of local jail populations, staff, budgets and programming in Georgia, North Carolina, and South Carolina for 2020. The data were collected through surveys administered to jail leaders and administrators. There were 28 responses received.


THE AVERAGE NUMBER OF NEW ADMISSIONS DURING 2020 WAS 3,326. 25% OF JAILS ADMITTED 613 PEOPLE OR LESS DURING THE YEAR.




AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION: 261 INDIVIDUALS


HALF OF JAILS HELD AN AVERAGE DAILY POPULATION OF 132 INDIVIDUALS OR LESS








Jail leaders reported an average of 263 confined individuals and an average of 28 non-confined individuals in their facilities at the end of the year.



During 2020, an average of 16 detention officers separated from employment, per jail. Thirteen new detention officers were hired, on average. At year end, an average of 10 detention officer positions per jail were vacant.

Educational Programming:


- Lower ABE: Lower Adult Basic Education or Literacy training
- Upper ABE: Upper Adult Basic Education
- GED: Secondary Education or GED
- ♣ ESL: English as a Second Language
- Vocational training: Occupational training (eg: auto repair, construction trades, computing)
- College: College courses
- Study release programs: release to community to attend school.


50% of jails offered secondary education or GED programming

Work Assignment:

- Facility support services: (eg: office and administrative work, food service, janitorial service)
- Public works: (eg: road, park, or public maintenance work)
- Agriculture: agriculture, farming, fishing, forestry.
- Correctional Industries: (eg: wood products, textiles, manufacturing)

Facility support is the most common inmate work available in jails.






Counseling:


- Religious: spiritual counseling
- Mental health counseling
- Alcohol/ Drug dependency: counseling/awareness
- Life skills and community adjustment (e.g., personal finance, anger management, conflict resolution)
- Physical health counseling: HIV/AIDS, hygiene, STDS
- Recidivism reduction programming: cognitive behavioral treatment
- Domestic violence counseling
- Parenting: child rearing skills
- Sex offender counseling

Substance abuse treatment is the most prominent reentry program.


Reentry Programming:

- Substance abuse treatment: alcohol and drug counseling
- Prescription medication: for at least 2 weeks post-release
- Legal assistance: advocacy
- Educational assistance
- Healthcare referral
- Transportation assistance
- Mentoring or other social supports
- Employability skills: (e.g., resume writing, interviewing skills)
- Employment: (e.g., job seeking, applications, placement)
- Housing assistance
- Case management





Relationships to support reentry are more common with criminal justice agencies than with outside agencies



The above figure illustrates the percentage of jails that perform each of the above three tasks to assist released individuals in successful reentry.
